

Heads or Tails

The two sides of a coin are called "heads" and "tails." The heads' side shows the head of a great man or woman. But the other side does not show a tail. So, why is this side called "tails"?

A long time ago, all coins showed the king's head on the front and an animal's body on the back. So people gave the name "heads" to the side that showed a person and "tails" to the side that showed an animal. Years ago an American nickel had a buffalo on one side and a person on the other side. Today most coins don't show animals. But the words "heads" and "tails" are still used to name the sides of a coin.
